

From the Vicarage

Dear all,

It is not even the end of October and already I am preparing plans for Christmas – not the church plans, they've been sorted since August – but all the different tasks needed at home.

First dilemma – do I write and post Christmas cards? Postage is now SO expensive it seems such a wasteful use of scant resources, so like last year many cards will be sent electronically, along with the catch up of the year's news. These are the challenges – and many more – faced by countless families across the world. But why do we do this to ourselves? Wouldn't it be easier to serve pizza and give everyone a book token and some chocolate?

Well yes, and yes. BUT One of the joys of Christmas is gifting something to someone you know they will absolutely love, to see their faces as they tear back the paper and realise. It's sitting round a table giving thanks for the blessings we share, even though our families can sometimes drive us nuts.

But it's also the carols and the Christmas decorations and lights, the catching up with news from friends. An opportunity to pause and to be thankful.

Thankful that God loves us so much he sent Jesus to show us what life with God was supposed to look like. A child born in the midst of poverty and persecution – who would grow to be a man who would change the world forever. Who would give His life so that we could know forgiveness and restoration.

So, while the trappings of Christmas can get in the way, there's a reason we make such a fuss while our bank balances and blood pressure take a battering. It's so that we remember Jesus and all He has done and we get to share that gift, the best gift, with those we love.

Harvest Festival in Littleover

We held our first outdoor Harvest Celebration down at Hannah Fields Community Garden and were made very welcome by Ange and the team. We had over fifty people attending (not all from church either) and the sun shone.

Phil played the keyboard and in our prayers we gave thanks for the harvest, seeds, the workers and the hospitality offered so generously to all who come to Hannah Fields. We hope to return next year!











In Church we were blessed with amazing floral displays and plenty of food which was then taken on to Derby Food 4 Thought – a food hub in the city that supplies all the foodbanks across the city. Plus over £135 was donated to the Bishop's Harvest Appeal to support foodbanks across the Diocese. The instruments were put to good use during a rousing rendition of The Harvest Samba.







And Liz and Joan welcomed King George V Pre school to church to celebrate Harvest through crafts and songs. They were also very generous in bringing gifts for the foodbank.

Walking group in the Black Forest

Last year a group of nine pilgrims went to Galicia in Northern Spain to walk part of the Camino de Santiago. Having enjoyed the experience so much, we (the same nine), decided to do another long walk in The Black Forest.



The whole walk was 104km for those that grabbed an extra peak on the last day and we walked about 3,400 metres of ascent over the week.

We started well because the first 5km was mostly downhill and there were cafés beside Lake Tittesee. And most of the trees were quite green but over the week most of the deciduous ones had changed and the colours were amazing.



Our accommodation

ranged from bed and breakfast pension through to a mountain alpine hütte (like a small hotel, but with limited meal choices) to regular hotels. Each morning a small suitcase was transported ahead of us and we walked with a backpack. That alpine hütte was higher than Ben Nevis!



From there it was only a short climb up Feldberg where the Bismarck Tower flickered in and out of the clouds as we reached the summit.

Some of the walks were a slog, but the company was good

and we chatted as we walked. Mostly the weather was dry, we had only about 20 minutes of rain over the whole week.

Some days we struggled to find anything to eat for lunch but the evening meals were always well proportioned (for hill climbers) with lovely strong flavours and most of us tried local specialities. The soups were gorgeous and super thick, goulashes and onion soups were the best. The meats were mainly pork (and yes, there were some vegetables) but there was veal and game too. Local fresh water fish was unusual, has anyone ever heard of Zander? With our high calorie exercise we quickly adapted to German high protein

breakfasts. There were always plenty of cold meat and cheese choices.

One day was a sightseeing wonder. We started by walking down the side of the Todtnauberg waterfall. Still photos don't do it justice, you really need the sound and the flow in a video to capture it properly.



Later that day we had to take a chair lift up out of the valley so we could continue our longest hike (23km). One of the group was scared of heights and had been dreading this part of our expedition from day one, but we



all made it to the top without falling off!

One of our stays we were hosted by a couple who were evangelical protestants. This is unusual in the south of Germany, because it is mainly Catholic. We talked to her about faith for a while. English is not widely spoken in the Black Forest area so conversation sometimes required gesturing and testing alternative words. Some of us had been learning German before the trip so we got by. The only church that was open for us was in Schluchsee (by the biggest lake in the Black Forest), which had some remarkable structures. Remembrance Sunday Service 10.45am

This Remembrance Sunday will be an opportunity to recall the events of the D-Day landings 80 years ago. This allied assault on the coast of France marked a turning point in the war, while also resulting in a tremendous loss of life.

Remembrance Sunday is on 10 November and we will gather with the wider community at 10.45am at our War Memorial to sing, pray and stand in silence to honour those who gave their lives so that we and many millions of others might live in freedom.



This will then be followed by a service in church. It is the one time of the year where we are more formally Anglican to lead our village to remember and give thanks for those who shared these streets, who gave their lives in war.

The collection taken at this service will go to the Poppy Appeal via The Royal British Legion (Littleover Branch).

Bereavement Service at 4pm



Later that day, we will hold our annual bereavement service where we offer space for those who are living with the loss of those they have loved.

The service offers familiar prayers and readings as well as an opportunity to light a candle and hear the names of those who have died read out into the darkness.

Living with grief can be difficult and isolating and this service offers space with others who also need time and space to remember and give thanks for those they have loved and lost.

Whether your bereavement is recent or of many years, you are welcome.

Littleover in Bloom

The results of the East Midlands in Bloom competition are out, 'Littleover', was awarded a Silver Gilt award, and for the fourth time a silver tray awarded to the, 'Best in our Category'!

We also won a Judges Award for our initiative in our RNLI display signposting routes to the sea, they said: "The main bed in the village, commemorating 200 years of the RNLI was hosting a newly painted RNLI inspector, a signpost indicating the direction to coastal areas and a seagull. These were amongst an eye-catching area planted with perennials and shrubs with an extra splash of colourful annuals. The use of sempervivums to create the '200' was a clever idea."

Hannah Fields won a, 'Gold award', for the best Commercial premises, and the work they do with people who want to learn skills, gain experience, meet and socialise, buy and eat local produce. David and Catherine Burgess, scooped a Silver Frank Constable Award for their best front garden.

The Half Moon pub was awarded a Silver Gilt award for their, well maintained terraced garden. Finally, the Co-op funeral parlour was awarded a certificate from us for the most supporting business.


The next service will be a Carol Service on Thur 12 Dec at 2pm at St Peter's Church.


It's nearing the end of 2024 and we want to update you on our progress on our Creation Care MAP objectives.

At the start of 2024 we undertook to work towards contributing to the Church of England's Net Zero Carbon plan. As a church we have been looking at how we can reduce our energy use and change the way we buy and use energy.

On a much, much, smaller scale than the Biodiversity COP 16 (21 October-1 November) we are making progress with our Church Land Management Plan, which also helps us with working towards ECO Church silver award.

In September, some of the Creation Care team spent an enjoyable afternoon making birdboxes. Some of these will be put on trees in St Peter's Churchyard. The remainder have been shared with congregation members to encourage birds to nest in their gardens.







The ECO church award scheme is for churches and church buildings. We continue to encourage individual households to engage with the www.Creationcare.org national scheme as a way to make changes to care Creation Care for God's earth. If you decide to sign up, don't forget to link your household to Encouraging households St Peter's Littleover and Blagreaves as a way for us to share our collective progress.

Of course, these objectives are all part of the bigger picture in working towards Caring for Creation. If you missed the video we shared on 20 October, you can view it here youtu.be/NtTMQnfJovU It is important to keep in mind that caring for God's Creation is also an expression of how we care for others. The effects of climate change and diminishing biodiversity disproportionately affects the poorest and most vulnerable people first. What is the gospel message? Is it purely about personal salvation? Or is it about loving one another and caring for what God has created?

Open Doors – Arise Africa!

Millions of Christians face violent persecution for their faith in sub-Saharan Africa. According to Open Doors World Watch List research, over 90% of Christians killed for their faith last year were in sub-Saharan Africa, and the number of countries in sub-Saharan Africa recording extremely high levels of violence against Christians rose from 13 to 15 from the previous year. This rising violence is being driven largely by Islamic extremists taking advantage of political instability in the region.

The number of people affected and the area affected are both increasing rapidly. The region is facing a displacement crisis, with millions forced to flee their homes. Most of these people are living in camps for internally displaced people (IDPs) either in their own country or in neighbouring countries. Many have lost their means of livelihood too, as Islamic militants – particularly in Nigeria – take their land. And yet the world has not noticed.



In response, the African church is calling for their brothers and sisters around the world to join them in the *Arise Africa* campaign. It aims to see that the global community acknowledges and acts against extreme violence and supports the church to persevere – and to be resilient, resourceful and influential.

How many Christians are displaced?

According to Open Doors research, 16.2 million Christians in sub-Saharan Africa are displaced by violence and conflict. "Millions of Christians are displaced, here in Nigeria," says Pastor Barnabas, who lives in an IDP camp in northern Nigeria with his family, having been forced to flee after Islamic militants killed his brother and sisterin-law and badly injured him. "Millions of Christians are displaced across Africa. The news doesn't care about it, politicians don't talk about it, governments don't talk about it, global politics don't talk about it. Nobody talks about it."

Why are Christians displaced?

Persecution is one of the major drivers of this displacement. It's not possible to say that all 16.2 million Christians have been displaced because of their faith, but there is strong evidence that many of them *have* been specifically targeted for following Jesus.

"When the terrorists come to churches and find Christians, they tell them that Christianity's time is over, and they should turn to the Islamic religion," says Pastor Soré in Burkina Faso. He and his family had to flee Islamic militants, and now live in two tents in an isolated area with other vulnerable members from their community. "They warn Christians to stop conducting services. After warning, when they come back later and find you in the church, they kill you."



Pastor Soré remains confident in Jesus. "I do believe that we are displaced, but Jesus is not and will never be displaced from our lives," he says. "He is always with us."

Which countries are affected?

Sub-Saharan Africa includes all African countries below North Africa, though Open Doors focuses its support on sub-Saharan African countries reporting 'high', 'very high' or 'extreme' levels of persecution in the World Watch List – that is, Somalia, Eritrea, Nigeria, Sudan, Mali, Burkina Faso, Mauritania, Niger, Central African Republic, Ethiopia, Mozambique, DRC, Cameroon, Kenya, Tanzania, Djibouti, Chad, Rwanda, Burundi, Togo, Guinea, Uganda, Angola, Gambia, South Sudan and the Ivory Coast. In 2014, far fewer sub-Saharan African countries had 'high', 'very high' or 'extreme' levels of persecution: only 12 of the 26 countries listed above.

What is the Arise Africa campaign?

Arise Africa is a global campaign aiming to raise awareness, financial support, advocacy and prayer for Christians facing violent persecution in sub-Saharan Africa. The campaign does that by raising money for the work of local Open Doors partners, joining in prayer across the world, encouraging media to report on violence against Christians and launching the *Arise Africa* petition.

What can I do?

Pray: You can join in a <u>month of prayer</u> for the persecuted church in sub-Saharan Africa. When signing the *Arise Africa* petition, you'll also have the opportunity to write a prayer to put on a virtual prayer tree.

Give: Your gifts to the Arise

<u>Africa campaign</u> will help support persecuted and displaced Christians across the region.

Sign: You can sign the *Arise Africa* petition and share it with your church, friends and family to make sure people are talking about this displacement crisis.

What does the Arise Africa petition ask? The global *Arise Africa* petition aims to stop the violence by calling upon the global community to ensure that Christians and other vulnerable individuals in sub-Saharan Africa are treated with dignity and respect by:

1. Protection: Providing robust protection from violent militant attacks

2. Justice: Ensuring justice through fair prosecutions of the attackers

3. Restoration: Bringing healing and restoration to all affected communities. You can sign the <u>petition online</u>, or you can <u>download and print copies</u> of the petition to gather signatures in your church or community, which you can then return by post.


