Structure, Governance and Management

St Peter's Church is situated in Church Street, Littleover, Derby and the previous St Andrew's Blagreaves Church has been redesignated St Andrew's Community Hub from 1 January 2023. They are part of the Diocese of Derby within the Church of England. The charity's working name is St Peter's, Littleover and Blagreaves PCC.

Governing Document

The Parochial Church Council of St Peter's Littleover (PCC) became a registered charity with the Charity Commission on 2 December 2009 (Charity Number 1133061). This charity registration moved to the new parish of Littleover & Blagreaves on 1 January 2023. The PCC operates under the Parochial Church Council Powers Measure.

Policies and procedures for the appointment of Trustees

The method of appointment of PCC members/trustees is set out in the Church Representation Rules. All church attendees are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC.

Objectives and Activities

The primary objective of St Peter's Littleover and Blagreaves PCC is the promotion of the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to the doctrines and practices of the Church of England. The PCC is to co-operate with the minister, the Reverend Alicia Dring, in promoting in the parish the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical as in accordance with the PCC (Powers) Measure 1956, as amended by the measure of 1969.

Public benefit

Promoting in the Ecclesiastical Parish the whole mission of the Church.

Achievements and performance

Church Attendance

In 2023 there were 174 parishioners on the Church Electoral Roll, 60 of whom were not resident within the parish.

Closure of Parishes

The Parish of St Andrew's Blagreaves and St Peter's Littleover were both formally closed on 31 December 2022 and the new parish of St Peter's Littleover and Blagreaves came into being on 1 January 2023.

The PCC of St Peter's Church, Littleover and Blagreaves 2023

Reverend Alicia Dring Vicar to the Parish

It has been a challenging year as we began life as a new parish – the paperwork was a never-ending mountain, but our final service at St Andrew's with Bishop Libby was full of friends and love and gratitude to God for all that He had achieved over the years. Now is a new season and we have no doubt that through the work of the Mission Action Plan and the Holy Spirit that Spring shoots will come to St Andrew's once again, as together, we seek to shine with the light of Christ in Blagreaves.

September saw my ten year anniversary as vicar to the parish – you very kindly marked the date with a wonderful card and very generous gift which we hope to use when we return to Norfolk in early summer of 2024. Thank you.

The team grew, and shrank this year, with the arrival of Emma Mallord in July as she was ordained Deacon and then Jason Kennedy as part-time Associate, when he and I were also licensed to All Saints' Findern and he became half-time Enabling Minister at The Haven Christian Centre. While this is challenging for Jason with so many different congregations to juggle it is a joy to have him working as part of the team in a paid capacity. We also said thank you and farewell to Rachael Brooks as she moved on to become an incumbent in her own right.

Taking on All Saints' Findern has added to the workload, especially as there are so few in the church to share all the roles that need to be filled. But I'm grateful for the support of colleagues, particularly in staffing the rota. After a very hectic Christmas ensuring we were seen at as many local events as possible, we hope to be able to share things in a different way come 2024.








During 2023, the MAP process has been bearing abundant fruit and I am hugely grateful to John Bird and the teams for all their work as the momentum continues to build and we are reaching out to more and more people across our community with the light of Christ.

However, my abiding memory will be the funerals as we said farewell to so many of our church family over the year. It is never easy saying goodbye, even though we know we will be reunited with them in the future. In the meantime, they go ahead and join the multitudes of faithful servants before them – worshipping God and giving thanks for all He has blessed us with.



Reverend Jason Kennedy Associate Priest

2023 has been a year of huge changes and new beginnings for us as a family and in my ministry. I started the year as Diocesan Missioner, working as a part of the Discipleship Mission and Ministry Team out of Derby Church House, but at Easter I laid that mantle down. That was the culmination of a period of listening to God and discerning his call, after nine years in a support role within the Church, back into local church ministry.



St Peter's has been a huge part of that discernment. At the end of 2022,

I'd been licensed to the church to work in what's called an SSM (Self-Supporting Ministry) role, alongside my paid Missioner role. So, from Easter, I increased my involvement in St Peter's; mainly Sunday ministry in leading and preaching, but also leading the fabulous Outward-Facing team for our Mission Action Plan work and getting involved with the staff team and PCC.

In May, I found myself preparing for two sets of interviews over the space of three days for two half-time roles; as Associate Priest working across the parishes of Littleover & Blagreaves and Findern, and also as Enabling Minister to the Local Ecumenical Project church of Haven Christian Centre in Heatherton. By God's grace, I landed both roles! After what seemed a long wait, on the 14 September 2023, I was licensed to both roles at Haven Christian Centre by Bishop Malcolm Macnaughton, Bishop of Repton (after being with Alicia as she was licensed to Findern at All Saints' Church about an hour before!)

I don't think I have ever felt such a clear call as I have done to local ministry here in the Littleover area. The welcome I have received across all three churches has been beautiful. I am particularly grateful for the support and care of Alicia as she has folded me into parish life with patience and kindness. I know that I am in the community to which God has called me.

That's not to say it has all been plain sailing. After nine years out of parish ministry, it's been a steep learning curve to come back into local church ministry. We live in a changed church and a changed world; new and different church and secular laws and regulations, a culture profoundly impacted by the legacy of the pandemic, the cost of living crisis and turmoil across the globe. Added to this, getting used to working in a church that is a unique blend of Anglican, Baptist, Methodist and United Reformed Churches! I've had to stretch ministry muscles that have lain dormant for some while, including funerals, pastoral visiting and church governance. Perhaps most significantly, I am still rising to the challenge of working across three churches and only being present at St Peter's around once a month. That has been particularly hard, and has led (in part) to my laying down the leading of the MAP group. Steve Dring and Doreen Bird are now leading that wonderfully well!

I want to thank everyone involved at St Peter's for your kindness, patience and welcome. It has been a privilege to serve you and the community that together we all love and serve over these last 12 months, and it continues to be so. I look forward enormously to what our amazing God has in store for us, and what he will do in and through us in the next!

Reverend Emma Mallord Curate

This has been quite the year of change for me! Finishing college, and obtaining my degree, then moving to Littleover, followed by my ordination as Deacon at the Cathedral, and then immersing myself in a new parish and a new area.

Things have certainly been busy, and I have had a lot to learn! I have loved getting to know



everyone at St Peter's. Finding out your stories, and histories, as well as seeing your love and commitment to our church and parish. Thank you for being so welcoming. I have also been trying to get to know the local area. And all of this has come by way of a lot of tea and coffee drinking along with the occasional slice of cake! (Insomnia is one of my favourite places both for meetings and for sermon writing!)

My main area of learning over my time so far as a curate has been switching my head from my previous Church Operations role (a bit of a mix of warden, admin, HR, and finance) into the curate role. This along with wearing the dog collar for the first time has all taken a bit of getting used to, but I feel I am starting to embody this new way of being. I've also had to learn more about how to lead from the front of church especially in a way that ensures you can all hear and understand me. Thank you for your patience as I have practiced and developed this skill, and I hope you'll agree I am now much louder and clearer!



The first part of my curacy has been shared with Rachael Brooks, which has been great as I have been able to learn from her experience. The highlights of my first few months have been, along with getting to

know everyone, working with St Peter's School, Confirmation preparation with Phil & Hannah and presenting them at the confirmation service at the Cathedral, my first Christmas in the parish, continuing to build relationships with my fellow Deacons, and generally settling into a new area.

Treasurer

This is the first report that I am presenting to St Peter's Church Family, and the first for the newly formed parish and charity of St Peter's Littleover and Blagreaves, which came into being on 1 January 2023. This year has been a period of transition and consolidation for our Church finances, as the treasurers of St Peter's and St Andrew's during the year passed over the baton to myself and the newly formed Finance Team.

Much of our focus in 2023 has been on closing down the St Andrew's bank accounts and renaming and consolidating our combined parish bank accounts. We have also transferred the new parish financial records onto a combined online accounting package. Given the merger of Parishes there are some aspects to the accounts as presented in the Annual Report and Accounts for the year ended 31 December 2023, that require further explanation:

- The charity number for the combined parish is the same as that previously used by St Peter's Littleover pre-merger
- Therefore, the opening balances for 2023 in this report relate to the closing Balances for 2022 of St. Peter's Littleover only
- There is a separate entry for the balances transferred from St Andrew's PCC at the commencement of the new parish
- The receipts and payments and closing balances for 2023 relate to the merged parish and charity
- The data for prior year (2022) relates to charity number 1133061 which in 2022 was St Peter's Littleover only.

The family of our church have always been faithful in their giving and 2023 was no exception. The vast majority of giving is by standing order, which we are very grateful for, as it maintains good sustainable cash flow and enables us to pay our bills and commitments. The electronic card reader and online giving continues to be available at all services which enables donations for regular expenditure as well as special collections.

Major items of expenditure in the year related to the purchase of the new chairs at the front of the church costing just under £10,000. Our regular maintenance of both the church and the community hubs buildings saw around £14,000 spent and we were able to meet our Common Fund commitment in full to the diocese of £75,710.

For the 2023 financial year we recorded a surplus of income over expenditure of £28,147.

I would like to thank everybody who has supported me; the Finance Team, Wardens and Alicia. Iona deserves a special mention as she deals with the banking of all cash and cheques, and processes all the paperwork for input to the accounting package on the computer. Arranges the payment of all invoices and expenses of our busy parish amongst many other administrative tasks unrelating to finance to keep everything running smoothly.

Finally, I would like to thank Azets for being our Independent Examiners for 2023 and propose that the accounts be accepted. In line with good practice, we would like to review the costs of the Independent Examination and ask Azets and another two accounting organisations to tender for the Independent Examination of St. Peter's Littleover and Blagreaves financial records for the year end 31.12.2024 for discussion and approval by the PCC at a later date.

Gift Aid for Financial Year 2023

As Chris Woodhams and Peter Vincent passed the mantle for claiming Gift Aid to me in 2023, I would like to start this year's report by formally thanking them both for their many years diligent service and for the extremely smooth hand over during 2023.

For the last financial year, tax recovered on Gift Aided regular giving, one off donations, and claimed under the Gift Aid Small Donations scheme amounted to £27,813. This represented almost 13% of church income.

The figures show what an enormous difference Gift Aid continues to make to the funding of the work of our church, so a huge thank you to everyone who supports the church with donations whether through their bank or through the electronic giving terminal in church.

Please remember that it is very important for you to notify the church office if your contact details change, if your circumstances change and especially if you no longer pay an amount of income and/or capital gains tax equal to the tax that we reclaim on your donations. PCC Secretary

With effect from 1 January 2023 the Parish of Blagreaves merged with the Parish of Littleover and the new united Parish of Littleover and Blagreaves was created. On that date we held a Special Meeting to elect Church Council Members to the new Parish. Jim Britland and Chris Jones continued as Church Wardens, Dave Hargreaves left and Bernie Burton joined as an observer, otherwise PCC members remained the same. Ann Vincent is the Deanery Synod member and Margit Staehr continued as Safeguarding Lead and Heather Newstead took safeguarding responsibility for vulnerable adults. Lesley Edwards joined the PCC at the APCM in April and undertakes the role of Treasurer.

During 2023 the Parochial Church Council (PCC) Trustees met eight times. PCC meetings included the January special meeting and an extra-ordinary meeting in April to discuss the finances of the new parish. Most of the PCC Action Groups have met through the year and their minutes are provided in advance of every meeting to ensure everyone has the information they need. In addition, the PCC Standing Committee met six times. All meetings start and end in prayer.

Due to personal circumstances, I was unable to attend some of the meetings and I am very grateful to Alicia Dring and those who stood in for me and made sure that PCC records continued to be updated. Your help was very much appreciated.

The Standing Committee and PCC meeting agendas continue to remain in a standard format which includes an action column. Most of the paperwork for the meetings continues to be distributed and stored electronically in an endeavour to save on paper and printing.

The significant topics that the PCC has discussed over the year have included:

- The workings of the new parish, the practicalities and the finance arrangements following our merger with St Andrew's Blagreaves
- Major ongoing projects led by the Fabric Team continue. These included ongoing maintenance of church buildings, churchyard and Glebe land, the new church gates, new chairs in church, and starting the refurbishment of the south aisle and creation of a library area. Many thanks to the small team that work hard in this never-ending job and the involvement of Community Payback
- Our Mission Action Plan (MAP) project moved from the planning phase into ongoing actions. Thanks go to the MAP steering group and the five teams that are busy making sure that objectives are achieved
- Safeguarding features as an item on every agenda. Thanks go to Margit Staehr (Children and Young People) and Heather Newstead (Vulnerable Adults) for their very important work
- The continuing support to St Peter's Junior School part of DDAT Academy Trust and the headteacher Frazer Smith. Our joint street fair in July was very successful and the proceeds enabled the children to go to the pantomime
- Working together with the other churches in Littleover and Blagreaves.

Thank you to all who have served, advised, encouraged and prayed for the PCC during this last year. We are thankful for faithful servants and sufficient resources to follow God's call.

Churchwardens

What good is it my brothers and sisters, if anyone claims to have faith but has no deeds? Can such faith save them? <u>James 2:14</u>

As we sat down to pen this report, it was hard to believe that Jim has completed the final year of his maximum six years allowable as a church warden. Chris will be starting his fourth year.

A key responsibility of the church wardens is caring for the fabric of the church. We retain a significant to do list at all times for the church, the churchyard and glebe lands as well as the St Peter's and St Andrew's Community Hubs. We would just like to thank everybody who has recognised the need to get involved and support the warden's efforts.



During 2023 the churchyard gates were replaced by new oak gates from Allan Scott's bequest, retaining and reworking as much of the ironwork from the old gates as possible. The radiator in church near the coffee area was replaced and a bespoke oak radiator cover fitted. The panelling at the top of the archway between the organ vestry

and the chancel was replaced. Work was done to the churchyard steps after a "lost" taxi damaged them. A major water leak to the church was traced and repaired. The disposal of the green waste produced by the churchyard has been managed by constructing large composting areas at the bottom of the churchyard. Please consider lending a hand as and when we announce the need for support for churchyard clean ups and one or two painting projects we have planned. The to do list remains challenging for 2024.

Another group of people we would like to thank are the Vergers, Duty Wardens, Coffee teams and Welcome teams. We could not manage without these groups of people and would like to thank everybody who has stepped up to assist with this vital piece of ministry.

Chris looks forward to the new year, working with the new Churchwarden who will be appointed at the Vestry Meeting before the APCM. A person who will continue Jim's "hidden" work of managing rotas and arranging faculties.

As we say goodbye to Jim as Churchwarden, it is no escape for him as he plans to continue as an active member of the Fabric Team.

Safeguarding Report

Sunday 1 January, 2023 marked the beginning of the new, merged parish of St Peter's Littleover and Blagreaves, resulting in a merger of the administrative side of safeguarding for St Andrew's and for St Peter's. The Diocesan Safeguarding Team's Dave Bowden was helpful with merging the two separate 'dashboards' into one online audit tool that helps PSOs keep track of safeguarding training and various policies. The dashboard uses a traffic light system with green lights giving assurance that we are complying with safeguarding requirements, and amber and red lights highlighting actions which need to be completed. A progress report is given at each PCC meeting where Safeguarding remains a standing agenda item.

Members of the Diocesan Safeguarding Team continue to offer dedicated support to PSOs, whether it be during the monthly drop-in meetings or on the many other occasions when we need their advice on training, eligibility for DBS, risk analyses, or when actual concerns are reported.

Their support is also illustrated by their instigation of a Safeguarding Sunday at Derby Cathedral November 2023 to celebrate the work of PSOs, with the Right Reverend Bishop Malcolm presiding, and their planned Safeguarding Conference next April 2024 with the Rt Reverend Bishop Libby Lane in attendance. Thanks are due to the whole team: Hannah Hogg, Sue Griffin, Judie Fogarty, Nick Harding, Amanda Sandland, Amanda Clarke and Dave Bowden for sharing their invaluable expertise.

Safeguarding Roles

- Margit Staehr was re-appointed PSO on 1 January, 2023 for the new parish of St Peter's Littleover and Blagreaves, with responsibility for Children's and Young People's safeguarding, overall administration of safeguarding training, DBS applications and Volunteer Agreements.
- Heather Newstead agreed mid-year to take on the vacant role of PSO for Vulnerable Adults and is completing the required training for that role. Heather is already a highly valued member of the PCC and of the Prayer Ministry. She brings a wealth of experience from her work as library manager in Derby City.

Safeguarding Training

There was a surge in processing DBS and completing/refreshing safeguarding courses as a result of having a new team of volunteers serving in the newly established children's groups at St Andrew's Hub (after school drop-in) and at St Peter's Hub (a monthly Messy Youth). Work also went into ensuring compliance with Church of England Policy as set out in "Safer Environment and Activities".

Safeguarding courses undergo regular development and finetuning so even though they have to be completed every three years (against five earlier), the courses remain relevant and fresh.

The new version of Domestic Abuse Awareness course was complimented by two attendees, independently of each other, for being both interesting and very well put together. The Safeguarding Leadership course – also a new version - involves a mixture of reading and preparation work, two zoom sessions, and some review and evaluation work. Various team leaders have completed the course, and the new version will be offered to the leaders of the steering group of the MAP team.

Safeguarding Queries/Referrals

- A query from somebody with whom St Peter's has previously had a safeguarding agreement. We are still in conversation
- A safeguarding referral to the Diocesan Safeguarding Team's Advisor and Case Worker. Flagged up again later in the year and resolved in conjunction with us.

General

- The PCC annually submits a statement to the Diocese indicating that the practice within the Parish adheres to its guidance. This is a formal obligation and ensures compliance with the duty under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy discipline measure 2016
- The PSO also submits a statement affirming that appropriate child protection systems and processes are in place.

It remains a privilege to serve St Peter's and the community in this way.

Mission Action Plan

By the end of 2022, the mission plan was written and ready to be implemented and at the Mission Service in January 2023, church family were invited to join one of the five mission teams. These had emerged from the consultations with the community and the church family:

- Outward Facing
- Community Engagement
- Children, Young People and Families
- Communications
- Creation Care.

The response was very good indeed, more than 80 people became team members and the mission Steering Group (SG) was created to co-ordinate and guide the whole project, to monitor progress and to report regularly to the PCC. The group held its first meeting on 18 February and since then, has met monthly either face to face or on Zoom, plus some half-days and an awayday. This first year of implementation has been a valuable learning experience where the SG has learned much about its role, the interrelationship between the five teams in practice and the constantly changing needs of the community.

The SG has:

- established a scheme for a monthly mission update each third Sunday in the month from one of the five mission teams
- put in place a risk assessment procedure for mission activities
- set up a process for accessing church mission funds
- examined the process of cultural change and the SG role in that.

The five mission teams started their work, each with a list of practical mission goals which had been suggested by the church family and the wider community. They worked very hard through the year exploring what could be done relatively easily and what would need more time to put into practice. Over the year the five teams achieved the following:

- established a valued support prayer team who meet regularly. Actual or virtual prayer walks occur, and use of the Blessings Book series aids their prayers and words for the community
- set up the 'Welcoming New Neighbours' scheme with information sheets and welcome bags stored ready to be used by members of the church family
- re-established the Giveaway Days at St Andrew's Hub
- built a database which lists a large number of advice agencies across the city, to be used in future signposting conversations with people in need



- discussed the employment of a Children, Youth & Families worker. Looked into the viability of employing a student / pre-qualified children worker with the Diocese
- met with the Diocesan Youth Advisor regarding provision for young people going forward and examined our options
- set up the Messy Youth Group meeting for Y7 Y11 on Sunday evening once a month at St Peters Hub
- set up Hot Chocolate and Toast Drop-in Cafe at St Andrew's Hub fortnightly on Wednesday after school, for 11-14 year olds
- increased the number of Messy Church dates in the calendar
- established a continuing liaison regarding children's books in the new church Library
- implemented the new logos representing our new parish of Littleover and Blagreaves
- started work on the new church website
- updated the church web page on the Diocese 'A Church Near You' national website
- worked together with the other mission teams to support them with their communications
- gave monthly updates to the church family about mission
- worked closely with the AA team on creation related themes such as Fairtrade, recycling and Harvest
- helped Friends of Littleover Parks plant wild flower plugs and organised a walk with litter pick in June
- school uniform recycling continues to be successful
- ran a Fairtrade stall at St Peter's School Fair
- considered a car share to church scheme can have an informal one but not an organised one because of safeguarding and insurance issues
- hedgehog boxes were placed in the churchyard
- successfully raised enough money to twin all our church toilets using an international scheme



• organised a communal church Christmas card to try to reduce unrecyclable cards.

By the end of 2023, the mission had moved forward significantly in its understandings, its actions and achievements. Huge thanks are due to the team leaders for their commitment and energy and to the team members without whom nothing would be possible. There is much still to enjoy, learn and do with much to be gained personally from taking part in the mission activities, we need and welcome further volunteers, just contact the team of your choice to join in.

These are exciting times. We look forward to what God will ask of us in 2024.

Fabric Resources Team

The Fabric Team included: Chris Jones, Bernie Burton, Dave Hargreaves, Jim Britland, Jan Jackson. With Allan Scott and Lee Smith for part of the year. Throughout the year we had five meetings.

Church

- New Library area, near kitchen. Radiator (3m double) replaced by BlueFlame with a smaller more efficient (2m triple) radiator, August. Allows space for bookcases either side of radiator. To protect children, a bespoke cover in oak faced MDF was supplied by Michael Pepper Joinery at £1380. Fitted by Sully of Master Joinery in November
- Top of the archway Chancel to the Organ Vestry. To replace torn expanded metal screen with oak faced MDF (same as above radiator screen with Fleur de Lys cutouts), supplied by Michael Pepper Joinery, cost £666 fitted by Sully of Master Joinery
- Church Alarm fitted by Chubb, February. Has dual communication by 4G and IP connections. Expensive second BT line no longer needed. Teething problems with random error messages
- Downstairs Toilets. One painting session by team
- Upper clerestory windows (in Church roof valleys) need attention. Tony Roe quoted £780 for repairs to damaged window sills (North and South side)
- Church office radiators not getting hot. Found to be a ball cock in the header tank stuck in the down position. Would have happened when radiator was replaced
- Office Lighting. Fluorescents replaced by LED equivalents
- Emergency Lights. North entrance vestibule and stairs to office. All three replaced by LED's with three hours battery back-up
- Gullies and gutters around Church cleared by Tony Roe
- Street Fair in July signage for Road Closed; Diversion and Disabled Car Park erected and dismantled
- PAT testing done by Fitzpatrick in April
- Lightening conductors tested February
- Upper Chancel stained glass. Backlight box in kitchen given two coats of paint
- Circuit Breakers replaced fuseboard in North entrance vestibule Nick Northover
- Boiler serviced by BlueFlame in June.




- Community Payback had decided not to come again because of accumulation of grass. After Ed Bentley removed the mounds of surplus gardening waste in the churchyard CP agreed to resume in May. Grass removal required three times a year. Pile initially relocated to path to Barncroft for better access, though it looked unsightly. Community Payback have built four compost piles at the bottom of the Churchyard with pallets and stones. Two are for sticks and twigs which compost too slowly. If compost turned every two weeks this should produce a good quality compost without the need for removal
- A tree stump had displaced one of the walls surrounding the war memorial. The wall was partially disassembled to give access to tree stump roots. Then re-built and mortared, a bigger job than first thought. The path to the memorial and around it was cleared. Completed September

22



- Churchyard Gates. Project started by Allan Scott and completed as his bequest. Gates made by Colin Tatlow in European Oak. Cast iron furniture modified and re-used from old gates. Metalwork given two coats Hammerite paint. Wood three coats Danish Oil. Gates removed and adjusted to minimize the gap
- There were eight Churchyard Clean-Ups from March to October, including a BBQ in September



- Maintenance of all hedges around the Church should be the responsibility of the residents. Jim advised all resident Church neighbours by letter
- Tree management. Ed Bentley quoted competitively and cut back hedge and laurel tree bordering on 6 Normanton Lane. Pollarded lime and maple trees to the South and east of Churchyard. Removed a maple tree which was rotten at the base. Reduced the height of a fir tree obscuring light from above the flat above Cosy Café
- Sycamore tree by Cosy Café managed by Fabric Team with hand lopper
- Churchyard steps. Damaged by a taxi driving round the west and south of the Church and through the gates to Normanton Lane. Steps bull-nosed and a piece rebated in by Cooper-Whyte Conservation at a cost of £715. Driver yet to pay the bill
- Water Leak in November. Noticed when taking the monthly water meter reading that the dial was spinning round. Severn Trent advised we were losing 300 litres of water an hour. Last bill was £1200 for the month, but nothing can be seen on the ground. Water could be heard running near the Mortuary shed external tap. There was a repair near the gas meter shed some years ago. Our insurers have rejected liability as wear and tear. Severn Trent offered a partial refund in 2024. NB in future may have to employ Brendan Hargreaves to oversee groundwork. Work done by Leighton
- We have taken on the responsibility of the Scout Hut grounds, not the Scout Hut which the Scouts own. Ed Bentley did a tree survey and for £520 removed a damaged maple tree. Fabric team cut down a holly tree bordering Churchyard and Scout Hut grounds. Cut into logs for the Vicarage
- The War Graves Commission is now complete. Chris Drury provided a Littleover War Memorial booklet contains pictures and locations of the war memorials in St Peter's Churchyard. He has placed a wooden cross on the graves before each memorial service over a number of years but feels he no longer is able to do this. Both Church Wardens agreed that this could be recorded in the minutes and carried out in the future by them each November
- Mortuary Shed cleared of unwanted and broken tools. 25kg of lead pipe recycled for £38
- Gas meter Shed. Cleared of unwanted tiles and slates
- Street Light by north east corner of Church. Bulb replaced by another fluorescent as LED not yet available. Works on a timer
- A Stihl strimmer at £340, a Mountfield mower at £365 and two wheelbarrows were purchased. Stored in Mortuary shed for use of Fabric Team and Community Payback.

St Peter's Hub

- Church Hub car park. Largest holes filled. Bag of Tarmac available to fill minor holes in car park
- Boiler serviced by BlueFlame in June
- Drainage covers to rear of Kitchen. Five drains cleared of soil. Raised area built around 3 of the drains to prevent soil falling in
- LED tube in entrance vestibule replaced with new tube and fitting
- Gutters repaired and Barge boards painted by Tony Roe £590
- Water filters purchased and fitted (Church and Church Hub)
- Security light bulbs replaced by LED's on two corners of large hall. Also above door to entrance.

St Andrew's Hub

- New fire doors were fitted. Subsequently were sticking but Bernie and Jim sorted
- Water heater was leaking. A replacement was fitted
- PAT testing done by Fitzpatrick in April
- Fridge Freezer replaced.



Churches Together in Littleover and Blagreaves

The year started with a service on 22 January, during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity when church leaders from Littleover Methodist Church, Newmount Methodist Church, Littleover Baptist Church, The Haven Christian Centre and the new parish of St Peter's Littleover and Blagreaves Anglican Church signed the Littleover and Blagreaves Churches Covenant to renew the Covenant between them.

Littleover and Blagreaves Churches Covenant

What we believe in:

- The Trinitarian theology of Father, Son and Holy Spirit as shown in Scripture
- The universal church as set out in the Apostle's and Nicene Creeds
- Working together to share the Gospel in Littleover and Blagreaves.

We Covenant with God and one another to share the Gospel by:

- Shared services and public witness at major Christian festivals
- Supporting Christian work in local schools
- Providing publicity about the churches to the local community
- Publicising each other's events when appropriate
- Sharing resources for mission to build the Kingdom of God
- Ministers meeting and praying together regularly.

There have been some ministerial changes during the year including Revd Ellie Ake moving on from LBC and Revd Jason Kennedy being appointed to The Haven as Enabling Minister.

During Holy Week services were held in the churches in the evening culminating in the Good Friday morning Walk of Witness through Littleover. At Christmas there was Carol Singing outside the Coop in Littleover and One Stop at the bottom of Blagreaves Lane and at two local pubs.

A more regular pattern was established for the ministers to meet for friendship, prayer, planning and information exchange and to encourage one another at monthly breakfast meetings in the community room at the Insomnia Café at the Littleover Co-op.

Events are published in Littleover Life and through the churches to inform and invite members and the community to participate. God is on the move.

Deanery Synod

The February meeting was the first Deanery Synod with our new Derby City Area Dean Rev Sarah Watson and Assistant Area Dean Rev Mina Munns. A report was offered about the Living in Love and Faith debate from General Synod explaining the motion from the House of Bishops, the process of the 8.5 hour long debates and the final vote.

The mission focus for the Synod was Growing Faith and Schools, and the members visited two out of several 'talking carousels' to discuss and learn about various aspects of working in schools, such as collective worship, school chaplaincy, mental health support and prayer spaces in schools, followed by a plenary session to share what people had learned.

At the May meeting, Sarah Watson introduced Rev Aiden Watson, the Strategic Lead for Youth Ministry in the Diocese, who said that he would be sending out a survey to Deanery Synod members, to get information on schools their church was working in. This will now include secondary schools.

Matt Barnes, Director of Discipleship, Mission and Ministry, introduced the main item, a presentation on the Licensed Lay Ministry Course, which is aimed at helping people to develop their discipleship. Rev Susie Curtis explained that the course is very flexible, to fit round people's own circumstances and life-styles. There are several modules, each of which consists of 10 sessions, 7 of which are on line, and 3 of which are Study days, conducted via Zoom. Each participant has a tutor and can attend tutorials. Each module costs £25. Modules include Everyday Faith, Opening up the Bible, Pastoral care, Mission and Evangelism, and can be assessed and a certificate awarded, to lead to Licensed Lay (Reader) Ministry, or non-assessed, purely to develop a person's faith.

The September meeting was the first meeting of the new Synod. Rev Canon Julian Hollywell gave a presentation on how Synodical Government works, from PCCs, to Deanery Synods, to Diocesan Synods, to General Synod. The Area Dean spoke on Safeguarding, urging churches to put posters on their toilet doors giving details of numbers people could ring if they needed help with their mental health. Bishop Malcolm then commissioned the new Synod and we shared communion.

The Joyce Harpur Charity

Background: The Joyce Harpur Charity was set up in the 16th century to benefit the poor of the parish and over the centuries has shared financial support with individuals in desperate need. The applicants must live within the parochial parish boundaries of St Peter's Littleover and Blagreaves and each application is assessed in the strictest confidence on a case-by-case basis. Grants are given out just before Christmas at the discretion of the trustees.

2023 has been another busy year for the charity – especially through December as the effects of the ever-rising cost of living is sadly affecting people in our parish and beyond, although we received less applications this year than last.

The current Board of Trustees comprises of seven people plus the clerk. There are five members from St Peter's Littleover and Blagreaves: our vicar, both church wardens, one church member and our curate. Two councillors appointed by Derby City Council, Emily Lonsdale and Ruth Skelton.

The AGM is held in the spring and the annual accounts are received at this time. Once accepted, the accounts are audited, many thanks to Tiffany Hey and submitted to the Charity Commission as part of the annual return. The Trustees meeting that followed on from the AGM reviewed the previous year's application process (along with the application form) and make plans for the autumn application window. At the November meeting, the finances and grants are reviewed.

In 2023, 19 applications were received including 1 out of area and 15 grants given. 24 children received gifts from the Derby City Mission Christmas Connection, 17 adults had gifts from Derby City Council's Secret Santa and 13 families received Reversed Advent Calendar Food Hampers donated by church members. On top of this 7 people were encouraged to visit the Jubilee Debt Clinic and 13 people were encouraged to apply for Christmas Lunch on Jesus, who provide a Christmas Day Hamper and a voucher to buy meat.

A lot of people from the congregation have made a huge difference through their generosity to those struggling in our parish at Christmas, so THANK YOU.

2. Vestry meeting

This was held to elect the churchwardens for the new parish. Two roles are available and nominations have been received from **Jim Britland** and **Chris Jones**. All voted in favour, none voted against and there were no abstentions and so Jim and Chris were duly elected as churchwardens to the parish of Littleover and Blagreaves.

3. Presentation of the new Electoral Roll

Jane Hughes presented the new roll – the amalgamation of the rolls from the previous parishes of Littleover and Blagreaves.

Jane thanked everyone for checking the roll and said a special thank you to those who helped produce it.

There are 107 residents and 57 non-residents from the St Peter's Electoral Roll and 5 residents and 7 non-residents from the St Andrew's Electoral Role, making a total of 176. There were however 2 duplicate names that appeared on both registers so the actual total is 174.

Jane Hughes proposed that the Electoral Roll be accepted as a true and accurate record. This was passed unanimously and the roll was therefore officially declared as the roll for the new parish of Littleover and Blagreaves. Alicia thanked Jane for her time and work and Jane confirmed that she is happy to continue in her role.

4. Parish meeting Election to PCC

The election of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) members for the new parish was then undertaken. There are 12 places available and nominations have been received from the following people:

All voted in favour for Ann to serve as a member of Deanery Synod and therefore the PCC.

Alicia therefore declared that Ann is duly elected to the Deanery Synod and to PCC of the parish of Littleover and Blagreaves.

Additional member of PCC due to place on Diocesan Synod

Peter Vincent is a member of the Diocesan Synod and so is automatically on the parish PCC. A vote is therefore not required.

Safeguarding children, young people and vulnerable adults

5. Mission Plan

6. St Peter's Financial Report – Sue Limberger

This is the third and final report I am presenting to St Peter's Church Family, as Tim and I felt God was calling us to pastures new, and we are now settling into our new home in Shropshire. It has been a privilege to serve St Peters for several years and we will miss this very special church family.

The family of St Peter's has always been faithful in their giving and 2022 was no exception. The majority of giving is now by standing order. However, the electronic card reader which is available at all services has been an invaluable asset allowing any church family and visitors to the church to easily make donations.

As usual each year brings financial challenges and opportunities. At the end of 2021 it was agreed that a new audio-visual system would be purchased and this was completed in May 2022, at a cost of just over £20,000, This would have not been possible without the generous donations from the church family, which covered over ³/₄ of the cost, with only a relatively small short fall needing to be met by Church funds. This was a big factor in enabling us to balance our accounts with an overall net surplus.

I would like to thank everybody who has supported me, especially Jim and Alicia, and of course a big thank you to lona who took over the banking of all cash and cheques in 2022, which enabled me to continue to support the church as treasurer whilst no longer living in Derby.

I would like to propose that the 2022 accounts be accepted and that the PCC will readdress the appointment of an auditor for the new parish.

Seconded by Jim Britland. Unanimous

Robin Wood's name was duplicated, this will be amended for the final accounts.

7. St Andrew's Financial Report – Peter Vincent

Those of you who have been used to the detailed summary of the accounts which previous Vicars requested me to give at St. Andrew's APCMs, will probably be relieved to hear that on this occasion what I have to say is far shorter!

At the time the St. Andrew's report and accounts for 2022 were printed the Independent Examiner's report was not available, but if anyone wishes to see her Report, please ask me.

Can I first express my thanks, on behalf of the St Andrew's PCC to all those who continued to make their offerings to the Church throughout the year, in spite of the fact that no regular services were being held in the building. This enabled us to meet our obligations, to make donations to Missions and Charities, and to increase our Reserves.

At the end of 2022, as well as approximately 3 months expenditure being held in the General Fund, as is recommended practice, we had a significant sum in the Building Reserve Fund, which has been built up over the years.

Whilst the money in the General Fund is being merged with that from St. Peter's to fund the new Parish's activities, the new PCC has agreed that the Building Reserve Fund should remain designated to major repairs or improvements of the St. Andrew's building. Before I close can I please make my customary remarks on Gift Aid, which are relevant to the whole Parish. If you currently have a Gift Aid declaration in force, but as a result of a change of circumstances or tax law you cease to pay income tax, please let the Church know promptly via the Church Office, so that we can cancel the declaration.

Conversely if you do not currently make your offerings under Gift Aid, but do pay income tax, please sign a Gift Aid declaration, which will increase the value of your offerings by a quarter, at no additional cost to you.

You have the St. Andrew's report and accounts for 2022, but if there are any questions, I will endeavour to answer them.

I would like to propose that the 2022 accounts be accepted. Seconded by Charlie Elston. Unanimous

Alicia thanked all involved for their work, time and efforts and flowers were presented to both Sue and Peter.
