From the Curate's Desk

Spring is one of my favourite times of the year, especially as we start to see all the new growth coming through.

This sign of new life begins with the snowdrops and soon blooms into glorious and colourful life with tulips and daffodils taking centre stage. After what has felt like a long and dark winter, these blooms seem to speak of new, better, more colourful times to come.

I'm sure we haven't seen the last of the winter yet, as there are rumours of snowstorms to come, and of course April will probably bring its usual showers. But these flowers are glimpses of hope. Things can change, there is light emerging from the darkness.

Sometimes life can feel a bit like winter where nothing seems to change, and it just keeps on going bleakly. Maybe because of illness, or a bad situation, financial worries, or other problems. We know we have to keep going, but its hard work.

The sight of a snowdrop pushing its way out into world speaks to me of hope in the midst of the troubles. In Luke we read about Jesus and his disciples on the Lake of Galilee in a storm. Jesus contentedly sleeps through, but the disciples panic and call out to Jesus for his help.

As he awakes Jesus speaks out 'quiet, be still' and the storm stops, and the water is calm. What I love about this story, is not just that Jesus could, and did, calm the storm, but that he was there with the disciples in the midst of the storm.

Just as it is with our lives, Jesus is with us in the midst of everything we go through. At any point we can turn to him and cry out for help, knowing that he has the power and authority to help us.

When the disciples asked for Jesus' help they didn't know what he could do, and hadn't grasped at the point that he had the authority to calm the wind and the waves, but they knew he would help, they knew he was the one to turn to.

So, I want to encourage you this spring, that whatever your current circumstances, whether they are bright and wonderful, or if they feel like they are dragging along like the longest winter, to know that Jesus is right there with you, in the midst of the situation with you. Turn to him, and ask for his help, and know his peace with you.

Family, Communications and Creation


Care. Each works on their own objectives and also work together across the teams to make things happen. Why do we do this? Well, our Mission Vision summarizes it like this:

What's a Carbon Footprint?

A carbon footprint measures the greenhouse gases (like carbon dioxide and methane) that our actions produce.

Everyone and everything has a Carbon Footprint.

Our personal footprint includes the emissions from what we eat, how we travel, what we buy, and what we throw away. The more we consume (food, resources, products), the bigger our footprint gets.


To check your or your household's carbon footprint, you can use a carbon footprint calculator. such as this one www.climatestewards.org/carbon-calculators


Groups like Climate Stewards (part of the A Rocha family) are dedicated to caring for God's creation by helping us measure our footprint and encouraging us to cut back where we can.

Carbon Fasting for Lent:

Christians often give something up for Lent, following Jesus' example of fasting in the wilderness before starting his public ministry. Lent can also be a time for self-reflection, where trying something new or different might help us give something up.

From Ash Wednesday (5th March) to Easter Saturday (12th April), consider giving Carbon Fasting a try.

Creation Care has pulled together resources from Climate Stewards and others to share ideas for weekly 'fasts' and daily challenges. Each week, Interlink will include a short prayer focusing on a fast suggestion. Faith Pictures:

A Journey of Testimony and Witness

During Lent, a time of reflection and spiritual renewal, Haven Christian Centre in Littleover will be hosting and leading the Faith Pictures course. This enriching six-week program, held on Thursday evenings from 7.00pm to 9.00pm starting on the 6 March, is designed to empower every Christian with the confidence to share their faith stories with others.

Faith Pictures is not just another course; it is a transformative journey that aligns with the command of Jesus to be His witnesses in the world. Jesus said (Acts 1.8), "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." Jesus' command is reflected by the apostle Peter in 1 Peter 3:15, where he encourages believers to "always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect."

Understanding Faith Pictures

Faith Pictures is an innovative and interactive

course developed by the Church Army, an organisation dedicated to evangelism and social action within the Anglican Church. The essence of the program is to help participants articulate their personal faith experiences in a relatable and impactful manner.

Throughout the six-week course, participants engage in a variety of activities and discussions that focus on developing and refining their ability to share their faith stories. The course material is designed to be accessible to everyone, regardless of where they are on their faith journey. It encourages a deep and thoughtful exploration of one's personal experiences with God, and how to communicate these experiences effectively to others.

Why Faith Pictures Matter

Faith stories are powerful tools for evangelism.

They provide a personal and authentic testimony to the transformative power of Christ in our lives. In a world that often values personal experience over abstract concepts, sharing our faith stories can make the message of the Gospel more relatable and compelling.

When we share our personal journeys of faith, we are not just recounting events; we are witnessing to the work of God in our lives. These stories can inspire, encourage, and challenge

others, providing a tangible example of God's love and grace. They remind us that the Christian faith is not just a set of beliefs, but a living and active relationship with Jesus Christ.

Course Content

Each session of Faith Pictures is carefully structured to build on the previous ones, creating a coherent and comprehensive

learning experience. The sessions include:

- Introduction and Icebreakers: Establishing a welcoming and supportive environment where participants can feel comfortable sharing their thoughts and experiences
- Exploration of Faith Stories: Participants are encouraged to reflect on their own faith journeys and identify key moments and experiences that have shaped their beliefs
- Communication Skills: Practical exercises are provided to help participants develop their storytelling skills, including how to structure their stories and make them engaging and relatable
- Biblical Foundations: Each session includes a focus on relevant Bible passages that provide a theological foundation for sharing our faith stories
- Group Discussions: Encouraging participants to share their stories with the group,
 providing an opportunity for feedback and mutual encouragement
- Prayer and Reflection: Each session concludes with a time of prayer and reflection,
 seeking God's guidance and empowerment for the task of witnessing.

Practical Information

The Faith Pictures course at Haven Christian Centre, Hollybrook Way, Littleover, will take place every Thursday evening from the 6 March, from 7.00pm to 9.00pm, for six weeks. We encourage

all members of the congregation to register, as it promises to be a deeply enriching and empowering experience. For more information and to register, please pick up a flyer at church or contact Lianne Green at lianne.green@havencc.org.uk. There is no cost to attend the course, but we do ask participants to register beforehand and commit to attending all six sessions to gain the full benefit of the program. Light refreshments will be provided.

Conclusion

As we prepare our hearts for Lent, let us remember the call of Jesus to be His witnesses. Faith Pictures offers us a unique opportunity to grow in our ability to share the hope that we have

in Christ. By participating in this course, we are not only deepening our own faith but also equipping ourselves to share the Good News with others in a meaningful and impactful way.

We look forward to embarking on this journey together and seeing how God will use our stories to touch the lives of those around us.

Littleover Village

Littleover Historical Society

As we walk or drive around Littleover today we don't see many cows. In 1865 it would have been very different, Littleover was very rural with many farms, not all having livestock, but many did.

Many of you will of course have seen the photographs of Albert Lane driving his cows up the Hollow on his way back to his farm.

The cattle plague of 1865-1867 was the most severe ever recorded in Derbyshire, caused mainly by drought conditions making the cattle population weak. It was thought that this particular outbreak had been caused by cattle being imported into the country.

Justices of the peace were given the power to close down markets and fairs where farmers mainly traded. This must have been a very anxious time, for both farmers who relied on providing milk, cheese and beef and the shortages for the populace.

This sounds so very familiar to the foot and mouth outbreaks of 1967 and 2001 and proves just how precarious farming is, both then and now.

Audrey Elliott 1942-2025

Audrey was born to Bernard and Florence Shepherd and was one of five children. She went to Bentinck Road Girls school where one of the classrooms was an annexe in the forest (now the park and ride for Nottingham trams) and during the first week in October all the fairground vehicles would arrive to set up for Goose fair. This could be seen from the classroom and caused lots of excitement.



Audrey was in the Brownies, Girl Guides, attended Sunday school and later the youth club at All Saints Church Nottingham. Audrey joined the Church choir (she loved singing as we all know) and during that time she was confirmed. She enjoyed Netball and was a good table tennis player.

On leaving School Audrey went to work in the fabric dept of Ashmore's a shop which seemed to sell everything. In her spare time, she loved Ballroom Dancing and Rock and Roll, and it was at a dance in Nottingham, in December 1960, that she met her husband to be, John. They danced all evening and were soon dating regularly. John and Audrey got engaged at the Goose fair in 1961 and were married in 1962 at St Martins Church Bilborough.

Their son Robert was born in 1974, they moved to Mickleover, and daughter Helen was born in 1976. Their family was complete. Audrey was a wonderful Mum who lived for her family, she loved cooking and enjoyed housework, she was never bothered about material things.

Audrey absolutely loved her work as a lunchtime supervisor at Ravensdale Infants school in Mickleover. She was gentle and kind but firm and any misbehaving children were sent to the lamppost in the playground to stand for a few minutes. When Audrey eventually retired the children presented her with a model lamppost.

Audrey's faith was very important to her. She and John attended church for many years, firstly at St Alkmund's, and later here at St Peter's, where they were part of the Worship Group, Ministry and Pastoral teams for many years.

John and Audrey were so blessed with children and grandchildren and to have 63 years together. Even when Audrey was diagnosed with Alzheimer's they were still able to enjoy life. 'It's just my memory" Audrey would say, "bound to happen at my age."


Audrey was truly loved by so many, and we are very thankful that she was part of our church family.

PASH Charity Concert

In February an evening of entertainment was provided by Derventio Brass and special guest Jonny Salt, pianist and vocals performing Jazz, Blues & Easy Listening. There was a broad variety of music which was thoroughly enjoyed by an audience of approximately one hundred and fifty people.

The concert was organised by Dave Hargreaves in aid of the PASH Charity and it was announced at the end of the evening that an amazing sum of just over £3,000 was raised from both ticket sales and very generous donations.









PASH Charity Concert

Dave Hargreaves, Patron of PASH Christian Organisation has since explained his involvement with the charity and how the money raised at the concert will be spent.

The charity is based in Kachieng, near to Lake Victoria in Western Kenya. It has been a very poor area for many years. Local people in this area are peasant farmers earning meagre money from selling vegetables, chickens and other produce from their small parcel of land, at the market in Oyugis.

In the 1990's, Dave was sponsoring a young man, Benard, from the Muga homestead whose father was the Pastor of the local Church. Benard and his college prayer group friends decided they would form a charity to improve the standard of living in the area. They named it 'PASH Christian Organisation'. Dave was asked to be Patron and form PASH UK who would raise money through monthly giving by friends of PASH, sponsorships for climbing mountains, walking ultra long hikes, summer garden parties, car boot fairs and by arranging concerts.

Any money raised goes towards the following; Normal annual support of orphans, widows and the impoverished with food parcels & other necessities. Also, provision of medicines for all types of illnesses including Malaria, Yellow Fever & Typhoid. There is no NHS in Kenya!

Every four months PASH organises Bible Teaching Conferences and gives bibles to those who don't have one (including new converts, usually up to 100). After the conference, classes are held with the new converts who then have the option of being baptised, sometimes in the local river.


The local community of Kachieng farms two plots of land (purchased by PASHUK). They farm 2.5 acres and grow maize, potatoes and tomatoes. Financial assistance is required and some support will be provided from the concert money to purchase seeds etc, manure, hire of labour for weeding, harvesting and transport.



Supporting Syria earthquake survivors: two years on

Two years ago, on 6 February 2023, Firas's* home in Aleppo, Syria, collapsed when a massive 7.8 magnitude earthquake shook the region, levelling buildings, destroying infrastructure and costing lives. A few hours later, a second quake of 7.7 magnitude compounded the disaster.

Firas received support from Tearfund after his family lost their home in the major earthquakes that struck the region. For him, the ability to earn an income through input he received from our partner has been crucial, but it is also the kindness of our local partner staff that has really impacted him.

Firas's family were among the thousands of people who no longer had a place to live. Years of conflict and disasters in the country had left buildings weakened and poverty widespread, damaging the resilience of both members of society and the structures they lived in. To protect his wife and five children, Firas set about looking for shelter and work wherever he could find them.

Blow after blow

For a time, the family lived squashed together in a single room in a relative's house, but even there, financial struggles led to their eviction. It was a double blow for Firas – the practical difficulty and distress of losing a physical shelter for his family alongside the deeply painful psychological battle he fought with himself and his confidence. To be a worthy man in Syria is to provide for one's family, but Firas was unable to place a roof over his children's heads.

Feeling utterly desperate, Firas moved his family to a different part of the country, but his parents urged him to return to be near them. He returned to Aleppo, but soon the family was left with nowhere to live.

Refuge in a place of ruins

They finally found refuge in his brother-inlaw's home – a building in dire need of cladding and repairs. Exposed to the elements and vulnerable to insects and reptiles, their living conditions were appalling. They had to cover the doors and windows to keep out the weather and the wildlife. After a while these temporary solutions were no longer usable. The weight of these hardships took a toll on Firas and his family. 'I felt helpless and extremely exhausted,' he tells us.

Illness, loss and despair

Firas's son, Rafiq, developed severe anaemia and vitamin deficiencies which resulted in kidney failure and he tragically passed away, which plunged Firas and his wife into what he describes as deep depression and a nervous breakdown. Soon after this, their youngest child began suffering from a chronic blood protein deficiency which means he can't eat solid food and has to survive solely on liquids. Firas and his wife frequently have to take their son to hospital.

A new solution: a new hope

While working as a cleaner one-day Firas came across a large crowd gathered outside a building. Curious, he asked what the place was and discovered it was a Tearfund partner organisation offering vocational training. Desperate for an opportunity to improve his family's situation, Firas enrolled in a home electricity installation course run by the centre. Here was a skill he knew would be in constant demand and this opportunity gave Firas hope!

The experience was transformational

In addition to vocational training, Firas took part in activities and practical exercises at the centre that helped him regain his self-confidence. The psychological support sessions were particularly powerful offering a safe space to share his story and hear from others facing similar struggles. He found he

was not alone. 'My family witnessed how much I loved being at the centre,' says Firas. 'My mental health significantly improved because of the kind treatment I received and the excellent trainers.'

Before long, Firas was able to start taking on small electrical jobs in his community, which provided some much-needed income. This financial improvement allowed him to continue his youngest child's medical treatment, and he remains optimistic about making further progress once he receives his toolkit, which will enable him to take on more substantial work.

Being truly seen

'This is the first time someone has truly seen me as a human being,' Firas tells us. 'I've often felt weak and exploited, but with you, I rediscovered my humanity. You embrace everyone, regardless of sect or religion, driven solely by the desire to help others. My wife, my children and I are profoundly grateful for you.'




