

From the Curate's Desk

Dear all,

I'm writing to you, not as the title suggests from my desk at home, but from one of my many favourite coffee shops! Whilst Alicia continues to recover from the small stroke, that she had before Christmas, I shall be writing to you. I'm happy to do so, and also so glad that I don't have to do this alone. As a church we are an amazing team, and I am grateful for all that you all do consistently throughout the year, not just in a time of need. St Peter's wouldn't be the place it is without you.

I have to confess that not having Alicia around is a bit like having my safety net removed. As the 'trainee' I'm here to learn, and whilst I have grasped a lot of new things, and I'm growing into my role, I don't think I realised how much I relied on Alicia being there as an advisor, a helper, a guide, until she couldn't be.

Why Pray?



Prayer is something that a lot of people do on a regular basis, and probably something everyone does in a moment of panic or in an emergency. But is that what prayer is all about? Just a quick demand for help? Or is there more to it?

At St Peter's we are starting a series on prayer, based on the Lord's prayer. Because we believe that prayer is for everybody. Even if we don't think that we are 'good' at it or if we feel intimidated about the need to have lots of eloquent words (which, spoiler alert, you don't!).

We are made in the image of God, made by the hand of God. And as such we are made to want to communicate with our creator. There is something impulsive, intrinsic within us that leads us to want to connect with Him that is greater than us.

On the next page we discuss three of the main reasons that we might use to pray.

Our Top Three Reasons to Pray

Copying Jesus

The easy, and perhaps too simple an answer to 'Why pray' is because Jesus did. And if Jesus did, then we should too! In fact, Jesus did it a lot. He would go off on his own, he would climb mountains, and stay-up overnight, or would rise early in the morning. Sometimes he would take some of his disciples with him, but often he was alone.



He prayed a lot. And his disciples saw this about him, and they realised that prayer was important to keep a close connection with God. They must have seen something different about him, because it led them to ask him 'teach us how to pray'. They wanted something of what they saw he had – teach us to pray like you do.

Connection

Prayer is about us connecting with God. And this is a two-way thing. It is not just us talking, and him listening. But we can also listen to what he has to say to us. Our relationship with God is like any other, it needs good communication in order to thrive. If we are honest and open with God then we'll build trust in him and our relationship will deepen. Prayer is a privilege, and not a duty. We don't have to do out of some sense of obligation. Instead, we pray in response to God's invitation for us to know him.



Prayer is also about us connecting with each other. The prayer Jesus teaches begins 'Our Father', not 'My Father'. Whenever we pray, we join with all other Christians in lifting our voices to God, together. We can know that we do not stand alone in our calls for things like peace and justice. Our voices and our requests join together. God doesn't call us to be alone, he calls us to become part of a community, his Kingdom.

Confession

Confessing is not just about sin although we do need to admit all that we've done wrong and ask for forgiveness. Prayer can also be a way of unburdening ourselves. When we're feeling stressed, angry, frustrated, or sad. Telling God our problems can leave us feeling less alone. We can know that he has heard us. In letting God into this, it helps us to realign our perspectives and remember who God is and how he is more powerful than anything we are struggling with, and therefore we can turn our focus back on him.



God wants to know you. Prayer is his way of inviting us into conversation with him, asking us to spend time with him. How can we not say 'Yes' to that request?!



There is so much to be encouraged about: -

We are regularly greeting between 35-40 young people at the Hot Choc & Toast Café and it is in the small conversations about our faith; about why we are there; about taking away a Bible to read that we realize the Lord is blessing the work.

The Open the Book team is now well established and regularly sharing Bible stories in St Peters School.



Creation Care held their 2nd Swishing event at St Peter's Hub on Saturday 18 January. Swishing, in case you're wondering is a fancy name for clothes swopping.

Reusing rather than recycling is almost always better for the environment.



Reuse options include charity shop donations, and selling options such as Vinted, and eBay. For some of us, swopping events like swishing offer another option.

Annually In the UK: 350 000 tonnes of clothes end up in landfill. The textile industry is estimated to produce 5-10% of global emissions. That's the same as the world shipping and aviation industries combined.









The St Peter's Swishing events always start with the opportunity for tea and cake and a chat.

We had 14 people join us this time. Nearly eighty items were brought along. It's a relaxed and friendly atmosphere. We hope to make it a regular event.



Littleover Village

Littleover Historical Society

Littleover has often been described in the past as being a long straggling village, having shops dotted around the Half Moon in Burton Road, down to The White Swan in Shepherd Street.

Having come across an article entitled: Jubilee History of Derby Co-operative Provident Society Ltd dated 1850-1900, despite the fact that it did mention, and even had, pictures of other surrounding areas/villages around Derby, there was no mention of Littleover.

Littleover has a long-standing connection to the Co-op, the first premises in 1877 were a corner shop with a bake house next door situated opposite the White Swan. In 1893 a new Co-op store was built on the corner of Burton Road, later becoming our local Library, now, Lymms Funeral Parlour.

The article did however mention along with five others, William North as being one of the eldest members of the society. William North 1837-1916 was President and benefactor of Littleover Baptist church, and also the Manager of Littleover Co-op.

Hannah Fields Community Garden



News from Tim Lee and Jigsaw Update

Location: Philippines

What I do: Improving lives of families living in poverty in the Philippines by supporting Jigsaw Kids to become a sustainable organisation.



Dear Friends

It's wonderful to write to you from Jigsaw in the Philippines (although by the time you read this I will be back home in the UK).

Snapshots of Jigsaw sharing God's love at the edges

Today I am visiting the Jigsaw centre at a place we call Forestry, the name given by Jigsaw staff to a large abandoned piece of wasteland dotted with old trees in the centre of Metro Manilla. A place which is home to hundreds of squatter families; one of the most desperate, vulnerable and needy places in Manilla. The homes are mostly makeshift shelters made of cloth and rubbish found abandoned around the city and a place consumed by drugs and alcohol. Those most at risk are the children, who spend their lives going through other people's rubbish, often at risk of abuse, with little or no hope for a safe and loving future. Jigsaw has been sharing God's love and building relationships within this community for eight years now. No doubt if you were with me today in Forestry, you would be absolutely shocked that humans live like this. You would also be shocked that amid the poverty is a large white gazebo nestled between two trees. This is the Jigsaw centre where people of all ages find security, significance, community, creativity and healthy boundaries. It is a beacon of hope in an otherwise desperate place.

If you come to Forestry on a Tuesday and Thursday morning you would see many young children at Jigsaw's 0-6 group playing, doing craft, chatting at circle time, listening to Bible stories, praying and receiving hot meals. On Wednesday and Friday, you might see children in the 7-9 or 9-12 year olds' club singing, dancing, playing games, learning to read and write as well as learning about Jesus. Another day you might see the centre full of youth from the Solid Rock youth groups, or young adults supporting each other through prayer and training the 18-25s' Agape group. Other days you would see mothers sewing, praying and reading the Bible in the ladies' empowerment ministry. If you came on the third Tuesday of the month you would see Jigsaw holding parenting seminars or education sponsorship meetings.



Much of what Jigsaw does is less visible, so you might not see the house-to-house visits where Jigsaw staff pray with and encourage families. You wouldn't see the children with disabilities team conducting therapy sessions with children in their homes, or the welfare team taking children to clinics and hospitals, carrying out counselling and so much more.

Focusing on growing security

Before I arrived in Manilla, I met with the director of Jigsaw Philippines in Kuala Lumpur and we spent five days in prayer and discussion, focussing God's guidance for Jigsaw's work and ministry. Our main aim was to discuss how Jigsaw could bring long-term change to the context and lives of the children we work with in Metro Manilla. We were led through prayer and discussion, to focus on the issue of vulnerability. God's ideal plan was for children to have Mothers, fathers and communities to care, love and protect them. However, poverty

often destroys these networks, leaving children vulnerable to abuse, harm and neglect. We felt led to develop short-term ideas to support parents and more long-term initiatives to bring about transformation of culture through children. It could seem insurmountable, but God can move mountains. We have decided to focus on three initiatives to reduce vulnerability and grow security:

- A parenting, family and community child protection advocacy programme
- Training older youth 18+ to be child protection advocates in the communities so that more children have a trusted adult they can talk to
- Integrate teaching about God's plan for children's security into Jigsaw's children and youth development clubs.

There is a lot of work to be done but we believe that reducing vulnerability is what will bring lasting change. Please pray for God's guidance and provision as we continue to develop these plans and initiatives.

- That the mission and ministry of Jigsaw will bring transformational change through God's love for children living in extreme need and poverty, bringing new life in Jesus




